Mrs. Dye has been in the advertising department of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch, public relations director for the St. Louis Board of Education, and most recently a member of the press relations staff of the Greater St. Louis Community Chest. Sister Anne Catherine, M.A., who directed the press relations of Fontbonne for the past four years, will be engaged with the publishing of the Sisters of St. Joseph of the St. Louis province.

ARLINE EVELD AND MARY ANN HILGEMAN WILL ENTER CARONDELET NOVITIATE

Two of last year's students of Fontbonne will enter the novitiate of the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet at St. Joseph's Mother House, 6400 Minnesota Avenue, on September. They are Arline Eveld and Mary Ann Hilgeman.

Arline received the degree of bachelor of science in June with a major in sociology and minors in psychology and philosophy. Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Eveld of 4217 Shreve Avenue, she was secretary of the senior class, an active member of the Society of Our Lady, and on the staff of the yearbook. Her high school is Rosati-Kain.

Mary Ann, a freshman from St. Joseph's Academy, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herman A. Hilgeman of 8728 Magdalen Avenue, Brentwood. She is the cousin of Mrs. Charles F. Digman, the former Joy Molumby '50. Known on the campus for her work on the organ, she was also a member of the Glee Club and a Sodalist.

TWO SISTERS OF ST. JOSEPH WILL LEAVE FOR THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS

Sister Victoria Joseph and Sister Inez Denise of the Sisters of St. Joseph will sail in August for the Hawaiian Islands to join the thirty-three of their confreres teaching there. Both have been students at Fontbonne's summer and Saturday classes since 1936.

The Sisters will report at St. Theresa's School, Honolulu, the first school established by St. Joseph's Congregation, who arrived in 1939. It now has an enrollment of over 700 children from kindergarten to tenth grade. Subsequent foundations are Holy Rosary School at Paia on the Island of Maui, with an enrollment of 480, and St. Joseph's School at Waipahu on Oahu, with 350 children enrolled. A fourth school is to be opened this September, St. Michael's at Kailua on windward Oahu. The Sisters also instruct public school children in other centers.

Sister Victoria Joseph Treml, who was a teacher at St. Joseph's Indian School, Keshena, Wisconsin, is the niece of Sister M. Theophane. She is an alumna of St. Joseph's Academy, Green Bay, and of St. Norbert's College, De Pere, Wisconsin. Sister Inez Denise Hallinan is a cousin of Sister David Marie. She taught at St. Francis de Sales School, Ste. Genevieve, Mo. Her home is in Denver, Colorado, where her alma mater is Holy Family High School.

TWENTY-EIGHTH SUMMER SESSION HAS 614 STUDENTS, WILL GRANT 22 DEGREES

The twenty-eighth summer session of Fontbonne will close on July 25, when 22 students will receive degrees, 14 being bachelors of arts and 8 bachelors of science. The total of students was 614, of which 97 were novices studying at the Mother House in Carondelet. Of the students on the Fontbonne campus, 517 in all, 44 are lay women and 474 are religious of 23 different congregations of the Middle West and Florida and Georgia.

During the session, weekly assemblies were addressed by the following St. Louisans: Dean Adele Starbird, Washington University, "The Importance of Guidance in Our Educational System"; Francis W. Kinkel, Fontbonne department of English, "Should a Nun Read Contemporary Catholic Fiction?" Cecilia Reichert, M.D., Fontbonne '37, De Paul Hospital, "Women in Medicine in St. Louis"; Thomas P. Neill, St. Louis University, "Catholicism and Western Civilization."

POPULAR CHILDREN'S THEATRE CLASSES TO BE REPEATED IN FALL

Sister Teresa Martin, dean, announces that the classes in dramatics for children will be held in the fall semester as a result of their popularity in the summer session. The courses are Creative Dramatics for Children, conducted by Sister Rose Edward, C.S.J., and Theatre for Children, by Miss Belle Marie Mullins. The children who form the groups are boys and girls of grades four, five, and six, approximately, and students and alumnae are invited to send children of their families or of their acquaintance to enroll in September.

Before the close of the summer session, these two classes will give demonstration programs to be held on July 23. In Miss Mullins' class, the smallest children will present "The Pepper-Pot Princess", a rhythm play. The older ones will give a Russian legend, "Clever Marya and the Czar" and a Polish legend, "Who Laughs Last". Nellie McCaslin is the author of the last two plays, and Margaret Weeks Adair of the first.

Students in Sister Rose Edward's class will present exhibitions of puppets. The youngest will demonstrate stick puppets in the story, "Little Black Sambo." The older girls will use "Under the Green Umbrella" and the older boys will use "The King of the Golden River" of Ruskin for their work with hand puppets. The three casts embrace sixteen children.

FACULTY CONTRIBUTION IN LEARNED JOURNAL

"The Metaphysics of St. Augustine" is discussed by Sister Rita Marie, professor of philosophy, in an article appearing in the July number of *New Scholasticism*. A comparison of the rationalism of St. Augustine and the rationalism of the Stoics, the paper is an adaptation of part of her doctoral thesis presented to St. Louis University. The editor of *New Scholasticism* is Dr. Vincent Edward Smith, speaker last March at Fontbonne's annual assembly in honor of St. Thomas Aquinas.

MUSIC DEPARTMENT PRESENTING THREE SUMMER RECITALS

Three distinctive recitals are being held by the musicians among the summer students. The first, at 11:45 a.m. today, July 16, is a program of numbers played by the small boys studying music in the preparatory division of Fontbonne and the schools of the parishes of St. Margaret, St. Philip Mori, St. Mary Magdalene, and St. John and St. James, Ferguson.

The class in Music Education, with Sister Rose Catherine, C.S.J., in charge, will give its demonstration on Tuesday afternoon, July 22, at 2:30 p.m. Its members, twenty-six teachers and prospective choristers of music, will play compositions for string instruments, including violins, violas, and cellos, showing what can be accomplished in both high school and grade school with a program for these instruments.

Marianne Bonner of next year's senior class, "Miss Piano" of the campus, will appear in a recital at 11:45 a.m. July 23. Student of Sister John Joseph, Marianne was a finalist in the Young Artists Contest sponsored last April by the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra.

PRAY FOR OUR DEAD

Mother M. Pius Noonan, C.S.J., president of Fontbonne from 1941 to 1942, died June 10 in St. Joseph's Hospital, Kansas City, Mo., after an illness of more than a year. She left Fontbonne to become superior-general of the Sisters of St. Joseph, holding that office until 1948, when she returned to the college as a part-time instructor. Previous to her term as president, she had been head of the department of philosophy for fifteen years.

Mother Pius, author of articles for various periodicals, planned the pageant for the Centennial of Sisters of St. Joseph in America, staged in the St. Louis Theatre. Leading parts were taken by Fontbonne students who were members of a cast of over a thousand.
