

## 1. RED FEATHER DAY

Afternoon, Barnes Hospital, Mullanphy Travelers' Aid, Peoples' Art Center.
- Bus No. 6 - Morning, St. Domenico Orphan Home, Community Music Schools Foundation, Southside Day Nursery.

- Bus No. 4 - Morning, Sister Gertrude, faculty members, biology, mathematics, and English majors.  
Afternoon, Sister Marguerite, faculty members, biology, and dietetics majors.
- Bus No. 5 - Morning, general  
Afternoon, Sister Annetta, faculty members, art students, chemistry majors.
- Bus No. 6 - Morning, Sister John Joseph, faculty members, music majors.  
Afternoon, general.

All students and faculty members who have been assigned specific buses are to occupy their reserved seats first. All students who have not been assigned specific buses are to occupy the available seats in all of the six buses. This rule applies to the freshmen, sophomores, and to all unassigned juniors and seniors. Each bus has a capacity for fifty passengers and each seat in each bus must be occupied to accommodate each member of the faculty and the student body.

Every trip is designed to give a perfect cross-section of the work of the Red Feather agencies, and so please cooperate with your tour leaders. Please do not remove the tour booklets from the buses at noon when you return to the campus. Please keep your tour booklet when you return to the campus in the afternoon. Attendance slips will be distributed in the assembly and will be collected in each bus at the end of the day's tour. It is requested that faculty members who have not asked for specific assignments occupy buses so that each bus has at least two faculty members in attendance. Every faculty member is actively in charge of the tour under the general direction of the Dean.

"Thousands of people in St. Louis are living in housing conditions which should shock the conscience of our community. They are living in that area which is immediately east of St. Louis University. It is that area of our community which gives us approximately 50% of our crime, delinquency, and disease. We cannot permit this social cancerous growth to continue. We can take action by voting in favor of the bond issue on November 2. The bond proposal is not perfect, to be sure, but it gives us a starting point. And all of us can be watchdogs in the community to make certain that no persons will be removed from their homes until provision has been made for their housing and to make certain that the housing projects in the area will be built for all people regardless of race."

Such is the message addressed by Dr. Wm. E. Van Taay, head of the department of sociology and economics, to students who vote in St. Louis or who are consulted by St. Louis voters.
