PONTBONNE MOTHERS! CLUB GIVES LIGHTED OUTDOOR SIGN

When the students return in September, they will see a new lighted outdoor sign on the front campus, on the middle plot near the sidewalk. This is a gift of the Fontbonne Mothers' Club.

The base is Missouri red granite, which is the same material as that used in the Fontbonne buildings. The sign itself is made of California redwood on which are inscribed the words, "Fontbonne College," in white.

Standing five feet high, the sign was designed by Joseph D. Murphy, Medaille Hall architect.

FONTBONNE WILL SPONSOR SECOND ANNUAL PROFESSIONAL FOOTBALL GAME, SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 11, AT OAKLAND STADIUM

The Philadelphia Eagles and Chicago Cardinals, two of the National Football League's best-known clubs, will give St. Louis fans their only glimpse of big-time football Saturday night, Sept. 11, at Cakland Stadium. Unlike last year's duel between the New York Giants and Baltimore Colts, the Eagles-Cardinals' battle figures to be a wide-open, high-scoring contest, as both teams, heading down the home-stretch of their training campaign, pull out all the stops to reach a peak for the opening of the regular season.

Both clubs are loaded with stars--the Cards with such standouts as California's Johnny Olszewski and Georgia's Charley Trippi,
the latter starting his eighth campaign with the Chicagoans, now being
led by Coach Jumbo Joe Stydahar. Trippi, playing at the unfamiliar-for him--position of quarterback, scored only 12 points during a sad
'53 season, but he led the N.F.L. in punt returns, which always brings
the fans to their feet as a ball-carrier threads his way through opponents down the field. Trippi caught 21 punts and returned them 239
yards for an average return of 11.14 yards.

The Eagles, coached by youthful Jim Trimble, formerly of Wichita, were the third-highest-scoring team in the major leagues a year ago. Only San Francisco (372) and Los Angeles (366) outscored the Philly eleven (352), which was led by End Bobty Walston. The 6-foot, 185-point Walston, fourth in individual point-making, tallied 87 points. Only Gordon Soltau (114), Alex Groza (108), and Doak Walker (93) scored more points than Walston. Other Eagle stars who will be on display here include Al Pollard, former Army star; Notre Dame's Neil Worden; Tony Rados, former Penn State standout; Adrian Burk of Baylor, the league's third-best punter. Burk averaged an even 43 yards a boot for 41 kicks. Pete Pihos of Indiana is another Eagle star. Trippi was fourth with a 42.9 average in punting.

Chicago, which defeated the Bears for their only '53 victory, figures to be among the Western Division's best next season with, as mentioned, such fine players as Olszewski, Trippi, George Summerall, Bobby Cross, Fran Nagler, Don Paul, Bud Ramsey, and No. 1 draftee, Lamar McHan of Arkansas.

Proceeds of the game will go to Fontbonne College and St. Joseph's Academy. Edward Marsh and Joseph P. Holloran, of the Fontbonne College Lay Advisory Board, are the co-chairmen for the game.

Tickets priced at \$2, \$3, \$5, and \$10 may be purchased at the Arcade Building Ticket Office. Mrs. E. D. Tenaglia (Alice Cafferata '31) is alumnae chairman.
