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'Dedicated Semester' — What, Why & When —

Beginning this fall, Fontbonne University will offer students an exciting new concept: the "dedicated semester." This unique academic venture allows the entire university — students, faculty and staff — to explore a single theme each fall semester.

"This invigorating new concept is not something you'll find at many universities," says Dr. Nancy Blattner, vice president and dean for academic affairs. "Our entire academic community is collaborating to give students a unique opportunity to look at subjects from a variety of perspectives and in many different ways."

In addition to courses offered by many of Fontbonne's academic departments, there will be films, panels, speakers and events to give students an opportunity to learn in detail about the semester's chosen topic. Many programs will also be open to the local community.

The theme for the inaugural dedicated semester will be "Judaism and its Cultures."

"At Fontbonne, a Catholic university, we recognize that the joint Jewish and Christian tradition has been at the center of the best of Western Culture: that scholarship itself begins in the quest for the truth of scripture, and the very idea of the university follows from this," says Jason Sommer, professor of English and poet-in-residence, and primary organizer for the fall semester's topic.

Anna, an assistant in the Ladue School District, also wanted to be more marketable within her institution as well as a role model for the couple's children. "My husband and my kids definitely helped me make this decision. It's been awesome," she says. "I love that Stephen and I both have an understanding of what the other is going

through. When I'm down, he's there for me and vice versa."

Stephen says their decision to attend Fontbonne was simple. His mother, Vera Cooper, who graduated with a master's in computer education in 1994, and his Godsister, Nicole Moore, Fontbonne's director of financial aid, were both recommending the university.

"Coming to Fontbonne was a smooth process," Stephen says. "I've recommended Fontbonne to everyone. People have excuses for why they can't go back to school, but we're married with kids. It's doable if you really want it."

Anna agrees, but mentions how fortunate the couple is to have such supportive parents who babysit their kids, Aryka, 5, and Stephen III, 3, on school and study team meeting nights. "Since OPTIONS programs are always on the same night, it was easier for my mother-in-law to block out that time to babysit. The consistency really worked for

Carondelet Lecture Series Premieres at Fontbonne



Renowned Vatican analyst and writer John L. Allen Jr. spoke to a packed house April 10 when he served as the inaugural speaker for Fontbonne University's Carondelet Lecture Series. Allen presented "Mega-Trends in Catholicism: Ten Forces Turning the Catholic Church Upside Down" in the Doerr Chapel. The event was co-sponsored by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet.

Allen is considered the most authoritative Vatican writer in the English language, according to the *London Tablet*, Britain's weekly Catholic newspaper. He is the senior correspondent for the *National Catholic Reporter*, CNN's Senior Vatican analyst, a frequent commentator for other media outlets and the author of five books on the Vatican and Catholic affairs. His weekly Internet column, "All Things Catholic," is widely read as a source of insight on the global Church.

Sister Mary Alfred Noble — Remembered —

Sister Mary Alfred Noble, CSJ, passed away Feb. 11 at Nazareth Living Center in St. Louis. She was 100 years old and had served almost 80 years in the religious community she loved so well.

Clemence Noble was born the elder daughter of Alfred and Mary Walsh Noble Nov. 20, 1906, in St. Louis. After graduating from St. Joseph's Academy and two years at Fontbonne College, she joined the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet in 1926, the first Fontbonne student to enter the religious community.

Sister Mary Alfred returned to Fontbonne in 1931 to teach psychology. After completing doctoral studies, she spent the next 25 years splitting up her time between Fontbonne and the College of St. Teresa (Avila), Kansas City, Mo., as teacher or administrator — serving as president at both institutions.

Sister Alfred was committed to Jewish-Christians relations and was honored by the Jewish community with the Micah Award in 1979 — she was the first recipient of this ecumenical award in the St. Louis area. St. Louis University also recognized her as an outstanding alumna in 1971 as did Fontbonne in 1986.

Once a Teacher

Jan Crites' goal during her 33 years at Fontbonne was to help create another generation of compassionate professionals who help people improve their lives. We caught up with this former chair of the Human Environmental Science (HES) Department, and we're happy to report she's staying busy and enjoying the next phase of her life.

"I hope that I made a contribution by enabling young women and men to see themselves as worthwhile, independent and thoughtful people who can manage their lives in a complex world and make contributions to their communities," Crites says. She taught classes on everything from family economics to the history of costumes for the HES department, which houses the major's fashion merchandising, dietetics, family and consumer science (FACS), and early childhood. "I've always wanted my students to step outside of themselves and see why people in other situations do what they do."

Crites has always had an interest in the social and political atmosphere surrounding her. Born in a small town just outside of Cape Girardeau, Mo., where most people either farmed or worked at the local shoe factory, Crites' mother attended college and her father was part-owner of the town Texaco station. "My parents just expected my sister and I to go to college because they understood the value of an education," she says. "In those days in rural communities, women's career choices were to get married or work as a secretary, nurse, teacher or factory worker."

She attended Southeast Missouri State and majored in home economics education with plans to teach. By the late 1960s, Crites earned a master's in home economics with an emphasis in family economics and management from the University of Missouri-Columbia.

"Women's roles were changing quickly then. They were adding roles as working professionals, but still raising families. I have always been interested in policy regarding the well being of women and children and the circumstances in which they find themselves," she explains.



Crites taught at the high school level for 11 years before coming to Fontbonne in 1972 to teach what was then known as clothing and textiles.


By the late 1970s. Crites became program director for FACS and then chaired the department.

"I loved the opportunities that Fontbonne offered and I loved engaging with my students, colleagues and administrators; we really functioned as a community, especially during my earlier years at the university," Crites says.

In retirement, Crites has a new outlet for teaching — as a real estate associate/broker.

"I like to work with both younger and older people, either educating them on how to purchase their first house or how to protect themselves when selling their last house," Crites says. "My work now is an extension of my academic life and the complimentarily of the two is great fun."

She has a keen interest in urban development and being active in her Central West End neighborhood and St. Louis city. Even in retirement, Crites is doing what she loves — helping people be their best.
