After a tour of Medaille hall, MR. ALFRED ROTH, noted Swiss architect who spoke at assembly Nov. 29, enthusiastically endorsed its architecture, calling it a true example of contemporary design. He expressed a desire to return some evening to view the ballroom when it has people in it and when he can enjoy the effect of the artistic lighting of its multi-colored interior.

The lecturer was introduced by Mr. Joseph Denis Murphy, designer of Medaille hall and dean of the college of architecture at Washington, to which Mr. Roth has come as a visiting professor for this year. Mr. Roth is a leader in architectural designing in his native country, which is often called the most significant work of its kind being done in Europe today. He is a director of "Werk", the official publication of the Federation of Swiss Architects.

The CLASS OF 1950 from its freshman days onward has been studied by a committee of faculty members with a view to discovering the reasons behind the withdrawal of 74 of its members from its ranks in the past three years. The committee investigating these causes of separation from college is Sister Agnes Joseph of the biology department, chairman; Dr. Mary Isabel Winslow of the personnel office, and Sister M. Martha of the home economics department. They will make a report of their findings at the meeting of the faculty Thursday, Dec. 1, at 4:30 in 301 Ryan hall.

At the Sodality reception next Tuesday, Dec. 6, at 3 p.m., in Fontbonne chapel, the speaker will be Fr. Joseph Anler, assistant pastor of the St. Louis cathedral and formerly of Little Flower parish, Richmond Heights, who was an army chaplain in the Pacific theatre during the last war. The mothers of the five students to be received have been invited to the ceremony. This reception will take the place of the assembly on that day, and all students will renew their CONSECRATION TO OUR LADY. Patti Trapp is chairman of the committee arranging the reception.

THE CONCERT OF GIUSEPPE DI STEFANO, Metropolitan tenor, with the St. Louis Symphony orchestra on Nov. 6, will be reviewed by its sponsors, the Fontbonne alumnae, at a special meeting next Sunday. Mother M. Marcella, president, will be presented by Miss Vita Viviano, chairman, with a check covering the returns on the program, one of the most distinguished events ever associated with Fontbonne. She will also receive a scrapbook of clippings of the extensive publicity prepared for the affair by the committee headed by Mrs. Catharine Gunn Dye.

Plans for the annual alumnae Christmas party will be formulated. As entertainment, music will be provided by the cast of Victor Herbert's "Sweethearts," recently presented by the Glee Club. The graduating class of 1950 will be guests at this function.

"English for Every Student" was the theme of the thirty-ninth annual meeting of Teachers of English in Chicago Nov. 22-26 which attracted SISTER M. LORETTA, acting director of the Fontbonne department of English, and Sister M. Gabriel, instructor in the English classes at Carondelet. Sister Loretta reports that its prevailing message for teachers of literature is that in their courses they go "backward in time" to the Bible and classical works and "sidewise in space" to include masterpieces of the European continent.

PREPARATION OF BAKERY GOODS was the subject of a foods demonstration by Miss Helen Rogers last Tuesday. Miss Rogers of the Wheat Flour Institute in Chicago gave the demonstration for the classes in experimental cooking and household administration at 9:30 a.m.

Fontbonne's favorite tenor, GIUSEPPE DI STEFANO, will sing on the broadcast of the Metropolitan opera next Saturday, Dec. 3, at 1 p.m. on KKOK. The young tenor, who captivated a capacity audience at Kiel auditorium Nov. 6 at a special concert sponsored by the alumnae association, will have a featured role in Strauss' Der Rosenkavalier. It is suggested that students who hear the program write their opinion of Mr. Di Stefano's singing to KKOK or to the Metropolitan Opera company.

The "Magnificat" will be chanted by the student body, and the resident students' choir will sing the Communion antiphon between each set of two verses. The text of the antiphon is "O taste and see that the Lord is sweet: blessed is the man that hopeth in Him." Singing is a token of good fellowship, and Communion is pre-eminently an act of union and fellowship with Christ and with our fellow-communicants.

A successful season of gymnasium work and swimming being held by the Fontbonne ALUMNAE ASSOCIATION in the college gym is coming to a close Dec. 19 when twelve sessions will have been completed. Agnes E. Reilly '29 who is a teacher of physical education at Roosevelt high school, conducts these classes which have had a registration of 51 and an average attendance of 41. Another series of lessons to commence in January is being considered.

NUTTY AS A FRUITCAKE. One of the signs of the approaching Christmas season was the baking of fruitcakes by the class in food preparation last Monday. True to tradition, the class baked the cakes in November though they are not to be eaten till the Christmas holidays.

The recent drive of the Community Chest for funds for 101 agencies, including many Catholic institutions, netted slightly over \$4,500,000, or 94.3% of its goal. This result compares favorably with those of the Red Feather campaigns throughout the country.

During the class period an improvised Advent wreath is to be set up and one of its candles will be lighted each week until the four are burning.

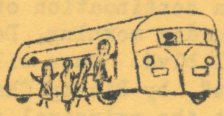

SISTER SUSANNE MARIE, registrar, will attend the meeting of the Missouri section of the Registrars' Association at Missouri university, Columbia, on Dec. 3. Miss Maude Elma Poole, former registrar of the St. Louis university School of Arts and Sciences, and present recorder in the registrar's office in the University, will accompany Sister Susanne Marie.

To avoid confusion on the part of enduring COUNTY-BUS passengers, the schedule for the Jennings-Maplewood line, running on Big Bend, has been secured. Running south, the bus leaves the Delmar loop 18 minutes after and 12 minutes to the hour, and passes Fontbonne approximately four minutes after leaving the loop, that is, 22 minutes after and 8 minutes to the hour.

Running north, the bus leaves the Maplewood loop 5 minutes after and 25 minutes to the hour, and passes Fontbonne 20 minutes after and 10 minutes to the hour.

However, it would be of no use standing on either corner after 7 p.m. daily or any time all day Sunday. In case you haven't already discovered it, the buses do not run Sundays and evenings at these times.



In the series of meetings being held at the request of ARCHBISHOP JOSEPH RITTER as a continuation of the program of the Liturgical Week last August, the next one is Saturday morning, Dec. 10, in the lower church of St. Francis Xavier, Grand and Lindell blvd. Mass will be offered at 9:30 a.m. with a homily, "Our Blessed Lady in Advent", by Bishop Charles H. Helmsing. Fr. Clifford Howell, S.J., of England will conduct the principal discussion on the liturgy of the Advent and Christmas seasons. All students are urged to attend, especially those affiliated with the NFCCS and its liturgical workshop.

Influenced by the ideals of the Catholic Round Table of Science, which encourages RESEARCH IN CATHOLIC INSTITUTIONS, Sister Helen Joseph of Fontbonne's chemistry department, who is chairman of the St. Louis Section of the society, and Patricia Lorenz, sophomore student, have undertaken a project, performing their initial experiments during Thanksgiving week. In connection with the work of Father Basil Luyet of the department of biophysics of St. Louis university, they are attempting to determine the devitrification temperatures of various starch solutions. This data may possibly be used to obtain molecular weights of starches, which has long been an unsolved problem. The vitreous state is obtained by use of temperatures approaching -80°C . This temperature is maintained by the use of dry ice and petroleum ether.

Fr. Luyet's chief interest is in the biological aspect of this problem, the effect of the vitreous state on life. He has vitrified one-celled animals and kept them in this condition for a long period of time and then found them still alive when brought back to room temperature. He believes the vitrification of starch solutions may have had a great influence in this experiment because of the presence of starch in all living organisms.

In accord with the Christmas spirit, the proceeds from the MISSION TAG DAY next Tuesday, Dec. 6, will be assigned to the Pontifical Society of the Holy Childhood to bring the Faith to pagan children. There will be no December meeting of the Mission unit because the second Tuesday of the month, the regular day for this session, falls on December 8, the Feast of the Immaculate Conception and a holiday.

The fifth in the series of noon-time recitals given by the students of music will be held Friday of this week, Dec. 2, when Evelyn Post, a sophomore, will give a program of piano numbers in the Recital room of Fine Arts building, commencing at 12:10. This will be a formal concert with compositions from the pre-classical, classical, romantic, and modern periods of music. The numbers are as follows:

French Suite Number III, J. S. Bach; Sonata in D major (K205^b), Mozart; Monento Capriccioso, Weber; Bruyeres, from Preludes, Book II, Debussy; Three Etudes-- A flat, Op. 25, No. 1; E flat minor, Op. 10, No. 6; C minor, Op. 25, No. 12-- Chopin.

Winifred, teacher of art in St. Joseph's Academy and for special courses in the college, attended the national convention of the Catholic Art Association at Marygrove College, Detroit, Michigan, on Nov. 25 and 26. Among the Catholic artists on the program were Ade Bethune and Graham Carey. Accompanying Sister Winifred to Detroit was Sister M. Eleanor, who visited her sister, Mrs. Catherine Bogan.

Fifteen colleges of the state will be represented at the conference of the Missouri region of the National Student Association, which will be opened by Mary Therese Hartigan, provisional chairman, at Missouri university, Columbia, on Dec. 3. The theme of the conference is organization of student governments, and the speakers include Robert Kelly, from St. Peter's college, New York, who is national president of NSA; Gordon Klopff, student personnel advisor at Wisconsin university; and Thomas Laco of Missouri U.

Accompanying Mary Therese to the conference will be Rosemary Stapenhorst, president of student government, Marilyn Miller, Jean Anderson, Patricia Herbst, and Helen McEvoy. These representatives leave Friday noon and return Sunday evening.

A HOLY HOUR will be held in Fontbonne chapel on the feast of the Immaculate Conception, Dec. 8, commencing at noon. It will be conducted by Fr. Walter J. Galus, C.R., spiritual director of the Sodality. In one of several apparitions made to Sister Pierina Gilli, a Daughter of Charity in Montichiari, near Brescia, Italy, a little over two years ago, Our Blessed Mother is reported to have called for a Universal Hour of Grace to be held at noon every year on Dec. 8, and to have promised numerous spiritual and physical favors to her children who keep this hour in a church or at home.
