SISTER M. MARTHA SCOTT, director of the department of Home Economics of Fontbonne, has been named acting director of the new program in Home Economics Education being iniated in June at St. Louis University. It is offered by the University with the cooperation of Fontbonne College, and leads to a Master of Education degree with a major in Home Economics Education. In this program, lower division as well as additional upper division courses in specific areas of Home Economics are given at Fontbonne. The faculty, advisory committee, and visiting lecturers will be from Fontbonne, the University, and other colleges, and will be taken from the departments of Home Economics, Education, Sociology, Psychology, and Religion, and from the University's School of Social Work.

This program is a milestone in the history of Catholic education, for it gives the first opportunity for a master's degree in Home Economics Education ever afforded under Catholic auspices.

At a special meeting of Sigma Beta Mu, Fontbonne's music club, held Jan. 23, SISTER M.
