Leunching a CLINIC TO IMPROVE STUDENT GOVERNMENT at Fontbonne, Fr. John B. Murphy, C.M., Ph. D., will speak at next week's assembly on "Leadership in Catholic Colleges." At present a teacher of biology both at St. Louis Preparatory Seminary and St. Louis University, Fr. Murphy was formerly the chairman of biology at De Paul University, Chicago, and is the author of two laboratory manuals, contributor to science journals, and member of science honor societies. He spoke to Fontbonne students last April 11 on conditions in China, from which he had just returned.


