Degrees Will Be Conferred Here, June 3

Twenty-eight Graduates Will Receive Hoods at Baccalaureate Ceremonies, Sunday Evening, May 31. Reception to Follow.

The tenth annual commencement for twenty-eight Fontbonne seniors will be held Wednesday morning, June 3, at 10 a. m., in St. Joseph's Chapel, Fontbonne.

The Most Reverend John J. Glennon, S.T.D., Archbishop of St. Louis, will preside. The commencement address will be given by the Reverend Russell J. Kirchenheuter, C. M., A. The Reverend Thomas J. Lloyd, rector of St. Edward's parish, will deliver the baccalaureate sermon, Sunday evening, May 31. Father Lloyd will also confer the Fontbonne hoods, lined with purple and gold, on the graduates.

Departments To Present Exhibits At Open House

Music, Dramatic Art, Home Economics, Art, and Physical Education Students To Entertain High School Seniors This Afternoon.

The graduating classes of the Catholic girls' high schools and academies throughout the city and county will be guests at an open house to be held on the campus of Fontbonne this afternoon from 1 to 5 o'clock. Various departments of the college will present recitals and exhibits. Tea will be served by members of the alumnae.

Members of the music department will give a program for the guests in Fine Arts Hall. The following selections will be featured: *Polonaise*, MacDowell, Rosaria Cento; *Arioso*, Bach, Elsie Dolores Drummond; *Meditation*, Tchaikowsky, Betty Sturrock; *Nocturne*, wood-wind quartette, flutes, Ann O'Connell and Virginia Melican, clarinets, Mary Rose Schulte and Hope Davis, with Antoinette Bafunne at the piano; *Seqquidella*, Albeniz, Mary Louise Knechel.

Rita Buechler, representing the dramatic art department, will give "At the Sign of the Cleft Heart," a dramatic reading by Adams. Students from the art department will demonstrate and exhibit specimens of weaving, and painting done in water color and in oil.

Displays from the home economics department will include model luncheons prepared and served in the Fontbonne cafeteria, an exhibit of dresses, coats, and suits completed during the year, illustrations of high and low calorie diets, graphic representations of the share of mineral and vitamins furnished by foods used in infant nutrition, and a demonstration in home nursing.

Students from the physical education department will give a dance demonstration. Anna Marie Grace, Mary Catherine Barry, Belva Dobyns, Virginia Foerstel, Charlotte Huckle, Emily Ochman, Evelyn Papin, Daphne Rameriz, Helen Weisbach, Ursula Schoeber, Mary Rose Sheehan, Melba Durbin, and Doreen McMahon will participate.

Besides these features, a general tour of Fontbonne will be conducted.

Federal Act To Benefit Needy Youth

Since the depression, law makers have been kept busy conceiving measures whereby the unemployed may be benefited. Naturally, these are all bills of a Federal nature, bills which would necessitate an expenditure from the Federal treasury for their existence.

The latest venture is the American Youth Act. Introduced into the Senate in January by Senator Benson, Minnesota Farmer-Laborite, the bill strives to put American youth back on its pre-depression basis. The Senator seems to think that youth has been too long forgotten. This neglect has occasioned an increase in crime, over-crowded prisons, transients, a decline in high school and college registration, and a breakdown of old standards and morale.

To counteract this discrepancy, Senator Benson recommends in his Act a system of vocational training and employment for youths between the ages of sixteen and twenty-five years of age, payment of all fees of needy students in high schools and vocational schools plus average weekly expenses. He suggests a system of employment on college projects of an academic nature, prevailing wages, for all needy graduate and undergraduate students. The Act will be controlled and administered by youth commissions and its money is to come from unappropriated treasury funds or taxes.

A Backward Glance At Life at Fontbonne During Past Year

With slow, but majestic, progress the present scholastic year is moving to an inevitable closing, a closing occasioned by the formal ceremonies of the tenth annual commencement. This year's history of Fontbonne will be recorded as one replete with outstanding events signifying that the education which Fontbonne affords her students is truly versatile, religious, cultural, social, and well-rounded.

Since Fontbonne is a Catholic college, religious ceremonies hold a prominent place. The Sodality of Our Lady is responsible in a large measure for the promotion of many religious services. It held its annual reception of new members, December 6, in St. Joseph's Chapel. During the week of March 16, it sponsored Vocation Week, and only recently, May 1, fittingly opened the month of May with the crowning of a student May Queen, Anna Muschong, who, in turn, crowned the statue of the Queen of Heaven.

As usual, the annual retreat was held January 28, 29, 30, and was conducted this year by the Reverend John B. Gerst, S.J., of Rockhurst College, Kansas City, Missouri.

Musicales and Lectures

In the way of concerts and noteworthy lectures, Fontbonne offered a wide and interesting selection. Early in the fall the renowned Slaviansky Russian Chorus gave a program in the Fontbonne Little Theatre. Then again, in November, Elda Vettori, Metropolitan Opera star, appeared here in a concert of well known and loved arias.

The Honorable Thomas C. Hennings, Congressman from Missouri, addressed the student assembly early in November. Mr. Hennings discussed various phases of congressional procedure. David S. Muzzey, Ph.D., professor of history at Columbia University, New York City, spoke here in January.

Sports

As one of the leaders in the horse show world, Fontbonne again opened the spring horse show season in St. Louis when it presented its third annual spring horse show at Missouri Stable Arena, 5200 Berthold, April 24 and 25. About twenty college students participated in the event, which was given in conjunction with St. Joseph's Academy. Play Day was inaugurated and proved a vitalizing success.

Centennial Celebration

Most important among this year's activities was the gigantic celebration in honor of the Centennial in America of the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet. The ceremonies were auspiciously opened April 15, with a Solemn Pontifical High Mass at the St. Louis Cathedral, at which eleven bishops assisted. An historical pageant, written by Sister Mary Pius, Ph.D., head of the philosophy department, was presented at the St. Louis Theatre, April 19 and 20. A cast of one thousand portrayed the stirring events connected with the St. Joseph Sisters and their one hundred years in the New World.

Social Events

The year was not lacking in social activities. As is customary the Student Council opened the social season with a dance, this time in a candy shop setting. The sophomore and freshman classes likewise gave dances which centered around novel decorations, and for which prominent dance orchestras played. The Junior Promenade, Febru-

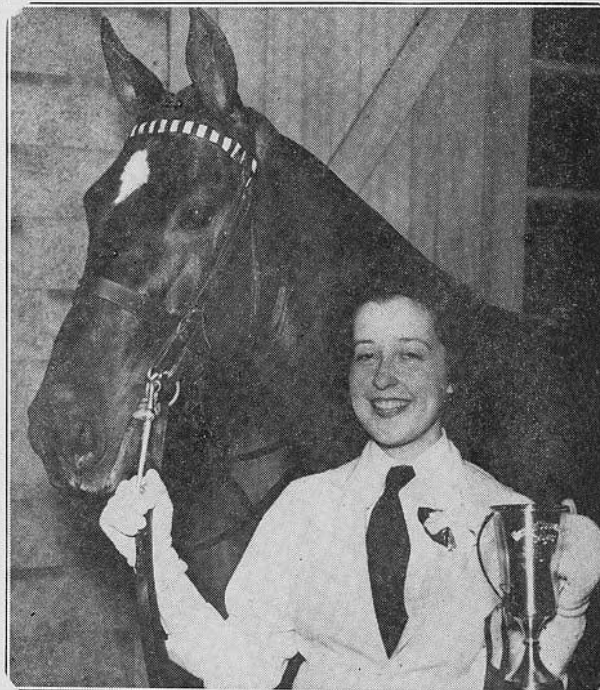
