From the Playwright

Feminine Energy was the product of my time in the Confluence Writers Project. What's funny is that I never intended to share it with anyone. I spent the program's first seven months writing a different play when I reached writer's block. I began to feel drawn to the story of Feminine Energy, but I didn't want to share it because it felt too personal. So instead, I initially wrote the piece as a cathartic release from my life experiences. At the time, I was turning 30 and deeply dissatisfied with my life. My PCOS symptoms had become increasingly unbearable, causing debilitating pain almost daily. And my faith- which had been a pillar in my life for many years- was in deep crisis.

I once read a quote saying, "doctors are to black women what police are to black men." So often, institutions created to protect and assist humankind are not safe havens for people of color. There were many moments in my health journey where I felt dismissed, stereotyped, and degraded by my healthcare team. Unfortunately, as I've learned over time, this experience is widespread for black women. Writing *Feminine Energy* became a safe space where I laughed and cried as I navigated through my grief over my life, faith, and health condition and embraced hope and joy at the possibilities of what could come. There's a lot of me in this play, but I also drew from the many stories I've heard from women of color as they navigated their health, relationships with their loved ones, and coming into their own.

About PCOS

Polycystic ovarian syndrome (PCOS) is a hormonal imbalance caused by the ovaries creating excess male hormones. If you have PCOS, your ovaries produce unusually high levels of hormones called androgens. This causes your reproductive hormones to become imbalanced. As a result, people with PCOS often have erratic menstrual cycles, missed periods and unpredictable ovulation. Small cysts may develop on your ovaries (fluid-filled sacs) due to lack of ovulation (anovulation). However, despite the name "polycystic," you do not need to have cysts on your ovaries to have PCOS.

PCOS is one of the most common causes of female infertility. It can also increase your risk for other health conditions. Your healthcare provider can treat PCOS based on your symptoms and if you have plans for having children.
