Meeting the author of their textbook was the experience enjoyed by the senior students in Foods and Nutrition when they attended the conference of the Missouri Dietetic Association at Scruggs-Vandervoort-Barney last Friday. The principal speaker was Mrs. Bessie B. West of Kansas State College, Manhattan, Kansas, the former adviser of Sister M. Martha, director of Fontbonne's Home Economics department, and author of the text used for quantity cookery and institutional management. The meeting dealt with food cost control and institutional work.

The annual program of the philosophy department in honor of St. Thomas Aquinas, patron of all Catholic schools, will be given at the assembly Tuesday, March 7, the feast of the saint. Members of the ethics class will hold a seminar entitled "The Catholic College Student and the Modern World." In this they will discuss the spirit of the modern world, the various "isms", and their possible effect on our lives. For the Book Week observance at St. Joseph's High School on Feb. 24, Sister Anne Catherine gave a talk on "The Pleasures of Reading Biography."

At the request of R. Sugranyes de Franch, professor of Spanish literature at Fribourg University, Switzerland, Dr. Mary Isabel Winslow, director of student counseling at Fontbonne, has given her permission that a microfilm be made of her dissertation, which is entitled "England and Englishmen in Spanish Poetry from 1588 to 1630." The petition for the microfilm was made to the University of Wisconsin, where she wrote the thesis, through the American Branch of the St. Boniface Society, New York.

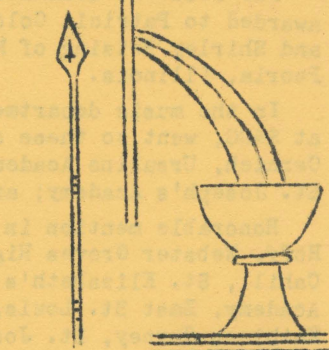

The popularity of salads among men, the Fontbonne investigators decided, comes from the fact that men are becoming "weight conscious" like women, and like women are growing aware of the value of fruits and vegetables to satisfy the appetite as well as their low value in calories. As to ingredients, the vegetable salads were found to be today's best sellers. That use of raw vegetables pleases those students of Nutrition, for they have now learned that some of the vitamins in the vegetables are soluble in water and are therefore dissolved in the cooking, and also that the mineral content in some cases is affected by cooking unless great care is used. After disclosing many other facts about salads that they found in their survey, the trio from third floor science closed their broadcast by quoting their motto, "Make it nutritious and delicious."
