Gathered in a classroom where French is taught, they handled fondly the familiar classics and dictionaries and gleefully pointed on the map of Paris to the location of their stores.

The visitors were part of the 18-member French mission on an NCA-sponsored American tour to study wholesale and retail store methods in six cities. Escorting them were Stanley Kedziersky of the Department of Commerce, a fellow-alumnus of Sister Berchmans from the Catholic University of America, and Mr. Arthur Meier, manager of Boyd's Clayton store.
