Students are requested to read these instructions carefully and then to keep them for reference.

Assembling at 8:30 a.m.: Lay Faculty, men -- Council Room; women -- Miss Mullins' studio; Religious Faculty-Blue Parlor.

Students: Seniors, Room 301 Ryan Hall; Juniors, 303 Ryan Hall; Sophomores, Den, Ryan Hall; Freshmen, Parlor of Fine Arts Building, with gown carried on left arm and cap in hand.

Order of Procession: Classes in this order, with class officers first in rank-Sophonores, Juniors, Seniors, FRESHMEN. After the students, the Faculty members.

Procession: From Ryan Hall to Fine Arts Building via Science Arcade, the Horse Shoe, across Center of Front Campus (fish pond area) to Fine Arts Foyer.

Places in Auditorium: Sophomores ON THE RIGHT SIDE as you enter, occupying ten rows to purple ribbon Juniors ON THE LEFT SIDE, occupying five rows after purple ribbon Seniors ON THE LEFT SIDE, in ten rows after yellow ribbon Freshmen ON THE RIGHT SIDE, in ten rows in front Faculty ON THE LEFT SIDE, in five rows in front
