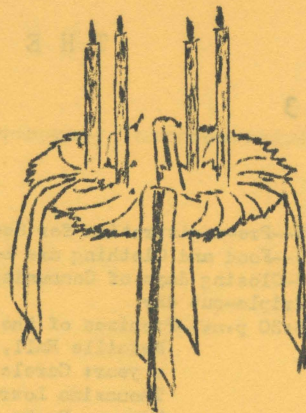
- Dec. 11-15--Pre-registration for Second Semester
