The pastoral letter of His Excellency, Archbishop Joseph E. Ritter, has been widely quoted. Some of its paragraphs follow:

"Lent is a sacred season dedicated by the Church to enable us to face the realities of life as viewed from the aspect of eternity, death, judgment, heaven, and hell. It is a time for detachment from even legitimate pleasures by way of mortification and of a more fervent practice of our holy religion. Through the use of the opportunities urged upon us during Lent, such as self-denial, daily Mass and Holy Communion, the daily Rosary, and the Way of the Cross, the Christian learns anew how he should always live.

"The world situation today has aroused all America to the grave danger to our national security. We have had to re-examine our state of defense and consider what sacrifices we must impose upon ourselves, perhaps for a long time to come, in order to make our country morally and physically strong.

"No less urgent because it should always be with us is the warning proclaimed by Our Divine Lord Himself, 'Unless you do penance, you shall all equally perish.' Penance is the basic weapon which the Christian must ever embrace to defend him - self in the spiritual struggle for an eternity of bliss.

"Prayer and mortification are the spiritual defense and strength not only of the individual Catholic, but they effectively challenge sin everywhere. A holy life vindicates the glory of God and seeks His mercy for a fallen world. We know that a nation given to vice and godlessness has no just claim to the blessings of peace. It is the prayers, the merits, and penances of the saints, of the Blessed Mother, and of the countless number of devout, right-living people which have so far prevailed upon the patience of God. Now is the acceptable time for all of us to join our prayers and penance to these mighty forces.

"Under the protection of Mary, the Immaculate Mother of Christ, who says to us, 'Do whatsoever He tells you,' we shall storm heaven by our prayers and acts of sacrifice during this Lent and the long Lent of our lives for the blessings of lasting peace and for the final joy of the great Easter day without end."
