## CALENDAR OF EVENTS

- April 2--Feast of the Annunciation of the Blessed Virgin Mary  
2--Deadline for articles for The Fountain, college literary magazine.
- April 3--Feast of SAINT JOSEPH, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary and Patron of the Universal Church, who is the special patron of the Sisters of St. Joseph and of Fontbonne College and St. Joseph's Academy.  
3, 2:20 p.m.--Senior and junior students majoring in music will give program at assembly. Margaret Shelton '47 will announce at the assembly the fashion show being sponsored by the Fontbonne alumnae April 6 at 8 p.m. in Stix, Baer & Fuller auditorium.  
A collection will be taken up during assembly for donations to the Red Cross. The Fontbonne unit reports \$119.25 received in March, plus a pledge for \$25. Eileen Martens is chairman of the drive on the campus, and Cornelia Rindlaub is chairman of the campus unit.

- April 4, 5, 6 and 7--Seventeenth Annual Folk Festival at Kiel Auditorium Opera House, with selected folk dancers, singers, and instrumentalists from 22 states and Canada.
- April 5, 4:30 p.m.--At its regular monthly meeting, the faculty will name the seniors to be awarded the Alumnae Hood and the memberships in the honor societies, Delta Epsilon Sigma and Kappa Gamma Pi. For each society five girls with an average of 2.0 honor points or more will be selected on the basis of scholarship, service to the college, leadership, and co-operation. With vacation wardrobes as its theme, the show will present styles for misses, matrons, and children. Tickets are \$1, and souvenirs are to be given to each guest. - April 9, 7:30 p.m.--Meeting of S.D.S. (Supply the Demand for the Supply) at St. Alphonsus (Rock) High School. S.D.S. is sponsoring a cartoon contest which Fontbonne students are invited to enter. Any non-professional cartoonist may submit any number of cartoons pertaining to S.D.S. activity to Gerry Schmalz, 5315 North Kingshighway before Apr. 5. ## THE NINETEENTH ANNUAL HORSE SHOW INVITES YOU !



The Nineteenth Annual Fontbonne Horse Show will be held on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday evenings, April 12, 13 and 14, commencing at 8 p.m., in Missouri Stables Arena, 5200 Berthold ave.

The show is set up and managed by the Fontbonne Horse Show Association, a group of interested parents and friends, and is held mainly for the riders of the college and St. Joseph's Academy, although sixteen of its thirty-four classes are open to other riders.

All proceeds from the horse show are used for the funds for scholarships for the coming year, one half going to Fontbonne and one half to St. Joseph's Academy. The balance of the expense for these scholarships is borne by the treasury of Fontbonne. In the college alone, four grants of \$800 each are given to music majors; two grants--one \$800 and one \$400--are awarded to day students; and two four-year academic grants of \$1200 each were awarded to resident students as a result of competitive examinations held February 17.

It is highly important, therefore, that all college students work for the success of the horse show, especially by purchasing tickets and by selling tickets to their families and friends. Student tickets are fifty cents this year. Adult tickets are one dollar if bought in advance of the show, and \$1.25 if bought at the door of the arena on the nights of the show. As a further incentive to the students to sell the tickets, ten dollars will be given the college student and ten dollars the high school student bringing in the most revenue by selling these tickets. In addition, one chance on a cash award of fifteen dollars will be given a student for each five tickets sold, either adult or student tickets.

The college will be represented by the following riders: beginners--Janet Haley, Ruth Raupp, Marguerite Unrein, Jacqueline Reilly, Carol Hoff, Sue Hosier, Myra Dettenwanger, and Susan Metzger; novices--Mary Louise Horn, Eleanor Kaiser, Marilyn Rovee, Marilyn Smith, and Patricia Kearns; advanced--Clare Burke, Mary J. Gratian, Shirley Wilson, Rosencarie Archangel, Marilyn Miller, Jean Kruempelmann, and Jeanne Laritz, Jane Mitchellette, Irene Peil. Two members of the class of 1949 are among the alumnae riders--Patricia Mitchell of St. Louis and Marjorie Burchfiel who is coming from San Antonio, Texas.

Each evening, a member of the music department of Fontbonne will open the horse show with the singing of "The Star-Spangled Banner". The singers, on order from Thursday to Saturday, will be Lorraine Hotfelter, Florence Mae Spaack of the Academy, and Doris Mae Lawin. Other music will be supplied by Carl Rosow's players. Programs and flowers will be sold each evening by groups of college girls, and others will be connected with the presentation of trophies.
