The Alumnae Hood was awarded to Arline Marklin at the meeting of the faculty on April 5. It is given annually to the senior who in the opinion of the faculty possesses the qualities required for leadership in the activities of a college alumnae group.

Membership in Kappa Gamma Pi was voted by the faculty to Elizabeth Eifert, Doralaine Garcia, Joan Hilker, Mary A. Pierce O'Connell, and Elisabeth Roehrig. This is a national honor society for alumnae of Catholic women's colleges, and candidates for its ranks are judged on the basis of character, scholarship, and leadership.

Delta Epsilon Sigma also received five seniors--Nancy Carter, Joyce Devine, Patricia Hayes, Joan Steffen, and Lily Vitt. This also is an honor society for Catholic alumnae and enrolls those who give promise of realizing the ideals of the Catholic philosophy of living. Delta chapter of Fontbonne is one of the forty-seven founding chapters of the organization. Both of these honor societies restrict the number of members they enroll to ten per cent of the graduating class.

The new music honor society, Delta Mu Theta, will receive two members--Doralaine Garcia and Evelyn Post, who is scheduled to graduate in January 1952. This organization is established only in Catholic colleges conferring degrees in music and offering furthermore two further requirements--an accredited course in Liturgical Music and an opportunity to attend on the campus each month a liturgical function which engages the entire student body in active participation.

Seniors majoring in science won their honors April 21 at the meeting of the college section of the Missouri Academy of Science at Warrensburg, Mo. Joyce Devine, Catharine Nelson, Nell Duerr, Joan Steffen, and Nancy Costello tied for first place in a competition in which they entered their report of four months of research they had conducted, "A Joint Project in Paper Chromatography". The science students of Warrensburg Teachers College shared first honors with them. Sister Catherine de Ricci and Sister Marguerite of the science department attended the meeting with these students. Joyce Devine is secretary of the Missouri Academy of Science.

Honors for proficiency in mathematics were announced at the annual banquet of Pi Mu Epsilon, national mathematics honor society, held April 13, with three juniors of Fontbonne included--Angelina Bolesina, Jeanette Maschmann, and Barbara Sullivan. At the same time Maureen Burke, sophomore, was declared winner of the society's essay contest with her paper, "Isaac Newton, His Life and Works" submitted in the junior division. This is the third winner Fontbonne has produced in as many years, for in 1949 Jeanette Maschmann was the first on the list in the junior division, and last year Evelyn Murrill of the class of 1951 took top honors in the senior division.

Announced April 23 was the recipient of the Alumnae Grant of \$100 for expenses in the junior year given to the sophomore, Maureen Burke, resident student of Green Bay, Wisconsin. This is awarded annually to a high-ranking student. Other holders of this grant were Patricia Hayes, now a senior, and Jeanette Maschmann, now a junior.

The ranking freshmen students of science were announced the same day. They are Marybel Steele in the chemistry courses and Mary Ann Dugan in the biology courses. Their names will be added to the list of freshmen scientists hanging in the lounge in Ryan Hall, first floor.

Ruth Raupp, resident student from Decatur, Illinois, who served this year as treasurer of the Student Association, became president of the association as a result of the elections held April 19 and 20. Majoring in sociology, Ruth is a member of the International Relations Club and also of the sodality and the Pep Club. Another member of the Raupp family is attending Fontbonne, Nancy, who is secretary of the freshman class. Ruth is the second member of her family to be student president as Barbara Raupp, now Sister Ruth Margaret of the Sisters of St. Joseph, held that office previous to her graduation in 1943. A fourth sister, Betty Raupp, now Mrs. Robert Barnett of Minneapolis, Minnesota, graduated in 1945. They are the daughters of Mrs. Ruth Raupp and their high school is St. Teresa's High School, Decatur.
