President Releases Varied, Recently Inaugurated Scholarship Program

The Fontbonne Scholarship Program was released yesterday by Sister Marguerite, president, after a meeting with the college faculty.

The Catholic Women College Scholarships, totaling ten and valued at \$250 a year, are open to students in Catholic and public schools of the Greater St. Louis area and are offered by Webster, Maryville, and Fontbonne. The program is now in its third year.

A merit scholarship, valued at \$250 a year, is open to students in the local high schools conducted by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet. These high schools are Rosati-Kain, St. Anthony's, St. Joseph's and St. Thomas'.

An Art Scholarship will be available to an incoming freshman for September, 1958; one will also be available at the end of the freshman year to a sophomore on the basis of achievement. Each scholarship is valued at \$250 a year.

There will be scholarships in speech, organ, voice and piano, valued at \$250 a year, offered by the departments of speech and dramatic art, and music. The speech department will also give a scholarship to a sophomore speech major on the basis of cooperation, achievement, and future potential in speech and theatre.

The Sister Irene O'Hara Scholarship, named in honor of Fontbonne's first president, is a resident student honor scholarship open each year to an outstanding senior selected by the college.

late Cardinal, is a partial tuition scholarship open every four years to an outstanding senior at Rosati-Kain High School, who is nominated by the Principal.

The Marian Award is given on the basis of a competitive examination among St. Louis Sodalitys. Its value is \$250 a year.

Miscellaneous scholarships include partial tuition scholarships to the Chicago Drama Festival, Greater St. Louis Science Fair, Junior Achievement, and the Chicago World Newspaper.

Each year the Fontbonne Alumnae Association offers a \$200 tuition grant to be awarded to a deserving college sophomore for use in her junior year. School records, service to the college, future potential, and financial need are the basis for the grant.

There are also Student Service Contracts, which are work opportunities on the campus. The number of hours and the monetary value vary with the type of work for which the student contracts.

Students Hear Austrian Educator At Four Lectures

Scholar, teacher, linguist, traveler, and journalist are nouns used to describe Mr. Erik Ritter von Kuehnelt-Leddihn, who addressed the Fontbonne faculty and students last Wednesday.

Mr. Leddihn was born in Austria, received his master's degree in Vienna, and his doctorate in Budapest. He has traveled extensively, taught school, and now lives with his wife and three children in Austria. Following are the topics he discussed in his talks: "The Future of Democracy in Europe", "America-Europe: The Great Misunderstanding", "Spain Today", and "Education in the Old World".

Speaking about the educational system of Europe, Mr. Leddihn stated that education is extremely different from that in the United States. He said home instruction is basic and important. There the child learns from an early age the necessity of manners, respect for authority, and humility. The child's formal education begins at six years of age.

He then attends the elementary school until ten years of age, after which he continues his education at the main school and middle school, placing emphasis on the study of art, language, music, science, and literature until he is ready to attend the university or graduate school, the final step toward a broad formal education.

Again Hungary

On October 23, 1956, a crowd of young people in Budapest committed the first act of a revolution which ended in tragedy for their country. Yet the few days of unrest in this Central European nation brought to the attention of all the world the tyranny of Communist domination.

The profound horror with which American Catholic College Students reacted to this tragedy is shown in the message of the President of the National Federation of Catholic College Students, delivered over Radio Free Europe November 2, 1956:

We are profoundly shocked at the brutal Soviet repression of Hungarian students expressing legitimate desires for basic spiritual and intellectual freedoms. . . . We pledge our prayers for a peaceful settlement with justice for the students and citizens of Hungary.

To fulfill his promise of prayer, the 200,000 members of NFCCS undertook to make November 19, the Feast of St. Elizabeth of Hungary, a special day of prayer for those killed or exiled by the revolution. On that day a Requiem Mass was offered on the Fontbonne campus.

Collections

Collections were taken for aid to Hungarian students and again Fontbonne participated, the students donating 150.00 dollars. Eighty-five Catholic Colleges of NF raised a total of \$7,774.45 for the relief of those who fled from Hungary. This extraordinary work enabled NFCCS to support the following activities on behalf of American Catholic College Students:

1. Catholic Relief Services desk at Camp Kilmer, New Jersey, to interview incoming refugee students.
2. Bard College, New York, incidental needs of Hungarian students in English language courses.
3. Emergency funds given to Student Governments for Hungarian Students enrolled at their colleges.
4. Pax Romana, IMCS, general Secretariat, direct work with Hungarian refugee students in Switzerland, Belgium, and Austria.
5. On-going United States programs for Hungarian Student relief.

Dependence

The story begun on October 23, 1956, is not ended. Many who fled their homes last year are still dependent on outside aid; many remain in temporary camps in need of support to obtain the necessities of life. Many are young people needing both spiritual and material help.

Once gain, in 1957, NFCCS celebrate "H-day", so that this second commemoration of the revolution in Hungary may be a reminder to American students of what Communism means to those who know it best. On November 19 a Mass was celebrated again this

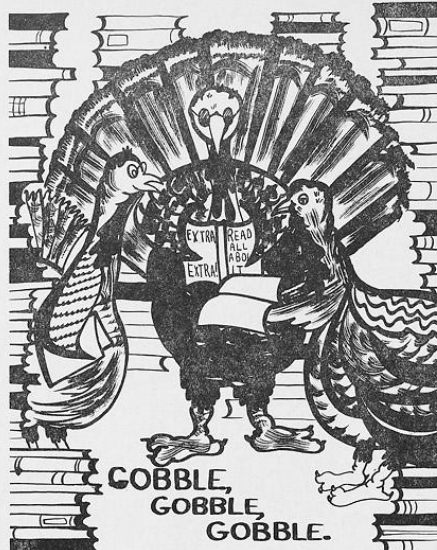
Elizabeth Marsh . . . "I don't particularly like the invention of T.V. and I would not pay money to watch it. Therefore, I don't approve of pay as you go television."

Writer Says Red Struggle With Church Has Reached Climax After Ten Years

The ten-year-old struggle between Communist dictatorship and Catholic Church "has reached the 'limiting-point' foreseen by Lenin, according to an article in the November issue of The Sign, national Catholic magazine, published here today. "Communism and Christianity are standing alone face to face, in single combat," it says.

Written by Albert Galter, pseudonym for a writer whose real identity had to be hidden for fear of reprisals to his relatives still living behind the Iron Curtain, the article sums up the results of the ten-year struggle against religion in these words: "In no country behind the Iron Curtain does there exist a single independent ecclesiastical organization. Everything is directed and controlled by the States."

Galter declares: "In those churches which Communists have allowed to remain open, there is still quite satisfactory church attendance. People may still profess their faith by going to church. Yet, it must be admitted that the Christian community no longer has the legal right to live publicly."

Become a "D.W."

The Mission Club extends an invitation to all students to become a Daily Worldmissionnaire. Who is a D. W.? It is a person who sacrifices something each day, a coke or a candy bar, and gives the money to the Missions. In addition to this daily monetary sacrifice, a D. W. also says an Our Father, Hail Mary, and Gloria Patrie, "St. Francis Xavier pray for us" and "St. Teresa of the child Jesus pray for us." These prayers are said three times each day.

The Daily Worldmissionnaires are a newly organized group on campus, and the number of students already enrolled is very large. Students are divided into groups of five with a team captain for each group.

Students are not only invited; they are urged to join this group. In enrolling, they are asked to see Sister Agnes Cecile, or any officer of the Catholic Students Mission Crusade.

Books You Will Like

The Spirit and Forms of Protestantism, (Newman Press, \$3.75) by Louis Bouyer, is a remarkable informative and stimulating book. The author, now an Oratorian living in Paris, is a former Protestant minister, speaks about the doctrine of Luther and Calvin, pointing out what he believes are the basic elements of the Protestantism.

Elaborating on three teachings—"the sola gratia" of Luther, "the soli Deo gloria" of Calvin, and emphasis on the authority of Scripture, Father Bouyer develops his points clearly, concisely, and scholarly.

Father Bouyer wants his readers to appreciate the significance of the Catholic Church and to understand the original meaning of the Protestant movement.

The Walled Garden, by Hugh Ross Williamson, published by Macmillan, (\$4), is an autobiography of a famous English convert and Laborite. The author is a descendant of the sixteenth century Cardinal Reginald Pole, the last Cardinal before Cardinal Nicholas Wiseman in the nineteenth century. He is also a son of an Anglican minister. He states very clearly that he owes his conversion under God to his father's friend, Dr. William Orchard, who was also converted to Catholicism. The event that precipitated his reception was the famous South Indian controversy in which the Anglican Church declared that the ministerial orders of the heretical and schismatic Church of South India were of equal validity with the Anglican orders.

Two new Fides family readers, *Key to the Psalms*, by Mary Perkins Ryan (192 pages, \$3.50), and *Together in Marriage*, by John J. Kane (160 pages, \$2.95) are appearing now at bookstores.

The first book is a commentary on the Psalms by the well-known author and member of the American Liturgical Board of Directors. Another liturgist, Rev. Godfrey Diekmann, O.S.B., editor of *Worship*, wrote the preface.

The second book, *Together in Marriage*, deals with the always challenging "together problem" of human life. Dr. Kane is a member of the sociology faculty at Notre Dame University.
