New Enrollment Soars To Peak

The total enrollment at Fontbonne is 652, of which 484 are week day students and 168 Saturday students. The senior class numbers 90; the juniors, 94; sophomores, 116; freshmen, 169. Unclassified students total 15.

Twenty states, in addition to Missouri, are represented in the enrollment. Far-away places include Ecuador, Hawaii, and the Virgin Islands.

The states are Missouri, New York, Oklahoma, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Georgia, Minnesota, Tennessee, Arkansas, Michigan, Texas, Wisconsin, Nebraska, Kentucky, Kansas, Connecticut, Ohio, Mississippi, and Virginia.

A small number of people often determines the selection of public officials, not because they have the power to do so, but because the majority of citizens overlook the importance of voting and thus endanger representative government. All Americans are beneficiaries of the wise decisions made at the ballot box and in the councils of government by the forefathers of this country. It is up to the citizens of today to carry on their tradition of voting in the interest of all the people, not just the few.

Scholarships Now Available

There are only a few weeks remaining to apply for Fulbright and Woodrow Wilson scholarships. For some 960 Fulbright scholarships for graduate study or research in Asia, Europe, and Latin America the Institute of International Education reminds prospective applicants that applications must be filed by November 1, 1960. This date is also listed for the Woodrow Wilson Fellowship. Fulbright recipients will receive tuition, maintenance, and round-trip travel.

General requirements are: 1) U.S. citizenship at time of application; 2) a bachelor's degree or its equivalent by 1961; 3) knowledge of the language of the host country; and 4) good health. A demonstrated capacity for independent study and a good academic record are also expected. Preference is given to applicants under 35 years of age who have not previously lived or studied abroad.

Applicants will be required to submit a plan of proposed study that can be carried out profitably within

Noted Artist To Give Talk

On Wednesday evening, October 19, 1960, at 8:15 o'clock in the Fine Arts auditorium, Ada Bethune, one of the foremost Catholic artists, will speak on the excavations at St. Peter's tomb. Her lecture will be illustrated with color slides.

Born in Belgium and now a citizen of the United States, Miss Bethune has dedicated her talents to the design of churches. Her education includes study in all almost every artistic medium from stained glass, wood engraving, and sculpture to fresco, tempera painting with gold leaf, mosaic, metal work, and calligraphy. She has received recognition in both religious and artistic publications including *Jubilee*, *Liturgical Arts*, *Catholic Art Quarterly*, and *Worship*.

For her inspiration Miss Bethune goes to the liturgy and to Sacred Scripture. Thus she expresses the ancient traditions of the Catholic faith in present day materials and design, giving her work a solidity, integrity, and clarity.

Roz Calcaterra Tours Far East

During the summer Rosalind Calcaterra, senior, and her partner, Mrs. Mary Jane Gury, toured the United States Military Bases in the Far East. As St. Louis national synchronized swimming champions, they gave exhibitions of their dual precision swimming.

Rosalind has also won fame as a soloist. She performed at the Brussels World's Fair in 1958 and won solo titles in meets in France, Spain, and Holland. She captured the national junior solo title in 1953 and has been Ozark A.A.U. senior and outdoor solo champion since 1954.

Monday night, October 3, at the Ozark A.A.U.'s annual banquet at the Naval Air Station's Officers Club, Rosalind received a plaque from James R. Londofo, re-elected president of the Ozark A.A.U. group. This plaque names Rosalind as Ozark A.A.U. Athlete of the year. She is now eligible for the national A.A.U. Sullivan Award.
