Nominations For Offices Scheduled

Kathleen Gentile, Hilda Bantle, and Constance Tauber, chairmen of the annual elections for Student Government Association officers, began the process of nominations with the posting of eligible candidates on March 8. Registration for all voting both in SGA and class elections was held March 13 and 14.

The following is the order of elections: nominations for SGA president, March 16-17; nominating speeches for president, March 22; voting for president March 23-24; nominations for SGA vice president, secretary, and treasurer, March 27-28; voting for vice president, secretary, treasurer, and NFCCS junior delegate, April 6-7. Other elections are to follow in this order: nominations for Student Council representatives, April 10-11; voting for representatives, April 13; nominations for class presidents, April 14-17; voting for class presidents and vice presidents, April 19; separate nominations for class secretary and treasurer, April 20-21; voting for secretary and treasurer, April 24.

All club elections will be held in May.

College Applies For Government Loans For Students

Fontbonne has made application for funds through the National Defense Act, according to Sister Alfred, president, who addressed the students Monday. This act provides for the creation of American colleges and universities, of loan funds from which students may borrow on reasonable terms for the purpose of completing their higher education.

A student may borrow what she needs up to \$1000 for any one year. There are no payments due, either principal or interest, until the student has been working for one year after graduation. Then the interest rate is 3% on the amount borrowed. The student will have ten years in which to complete the payments after that one year in which no payment of interest or principal has been made.

Each student if she is interested is asked to fill out before March 27 the note she received at assembly.

And Now---Two Buildings, Not One, Are Proposed

The best news that Fontbonne heard this year came as a surprise Monday when faculty and students learned that financial plans for two proposed new buildings will be applied for this week. Sister Alfred, president, told the students at an assembly; Sister Stephanie, academic dean, spoke to members of the faculty.

A new dormitory will be built with a federal government loan, to be asked for, and a new library also with government aid if the bill pending on this matter is passed.

Summer Session Begins June 19

The 38th Summer Session will begin June 19 and close July 28. Registration starts May 20 for local students and June 17 for out-of-town. Comprehensive examinations will be held July 5. Fifty-eight courses have been listed in nineteen different departments. These include the following: theology, philosophy, mathematics, biology, chemistry, history, sociology, psychology, art, English, French, Spanish, Latin, music, speech, business, education, home economics, and physical education.

Funds for the library have been solicited by members of the Fontbonne Alumnae Association since 1956. Last semester the students concentrated all their efforts on enlarging the library fund; their total was \$5,253.24.

It is hoped both buildings will be ready by September, 1962.

Liturgists Pay Honor On Layman's Day

"Layman's Day," April 17, 1961, is the climax of the activities of the year for the Liturgy Commission on campus, under the chairmanship of Kathleen Ryan. The plan for the day is as follows:

A panel discussion at 10 a.m., "What Is the Place of the Layman in the Church?" will have as chairman Mary Louise Langdon. Members are Daniel Abbott of Washington University's Newman Club; Russell Bley, Jr., of St. Louis University; Patricia Steffen of Maryville College; Marilyn Scheer of Fontbonne; and William Liggett, director of the National Conference of Christians and Jews. The delegate from Webster College will be named later.

A second discussion at 11 a.m. will be "What Is the Place of the Layman in the Parish?" with Rev. Jasper Chiodini, S.T.D., pastor of St. Dominic Savio and former editor of the St. Louis Review and Rev. Donald Sullivan, S.T.L., assistant pastor of Holy Redeemer parish in Webster Groves.

A Dialogue Mass will follow for the student body with a student director of the hymns, Kathleen Noser. Exhibits will be in the Fine Arts' foyer and lounge by various student groups including IRC, home economics, Sodality, Legion of Mary, and the art and music departments. The exhibits will be related to the idea of the lay apostolate. Marilyn Costello will be the director.

The principal speaker at the convocation at 2 p.m. in the auditorium will talk on the "Liturgy as the Source of Apostolic Life." The name of the speaker will be announced later.

Another Japan Day Rolls Around Again With Lots of Fun
