Seniors Will Receive Degrees May 28 From Joseph Cardinal Ritter, S.T.D.

Degrees will be conferred on sixty-eight members of the 1961 graduating class by His Eminence, Joseph Cardinal Ritter, S.T.D., Archbishop of St. Louis, on Commencement Day, Sunday, May 28, at 4 p.m.

Sister Mary Annette Walters, C.S.J., Ph.D., chairman of the department of psychology at the College of St. Catherine, St. Paul, Minnesota, will give the address. Sister Annette is also the executive secretary of the Sister-Formation Conference of the N.C.E.A. Baccalaureate services on Saturday, May 27, will begin at 10 a.m.

Another Dartford House

A second house on Dartford Avenue was bought by the Sisters of Saint Joseph last week. It is 21 Dartford, which belonged to the George Spearl estate. Four years ago the Sisters bought the corner house on Dartford and Wydown, which had formerly belonged to the Chris Kehoe family.

To be used as a convent for members of the faculty, the new house has eight rooms, two and one-half baths, a screened porch on the second floor, an open porch on the first floor, and a two car garage. "Amata," the black Plymouth, and "Christopher," the red Dodge, will occupy the last named quarters.

Fontbonne students will remember 21 Dartford as the house south of the pathway that leads from the college driveway to Aberdeen Place. The pathway, owned by the college, is a frequently used short cut to the street. Frontage of the pathway and house is 100 feet. 21 Dartford has been unofficially named "De Maupas Hall."

Four Receive Honor Awards

Three seniors and a freshman have recently received honors. Kathleen Gentile is the recipient of an assistantship in psychology at Fordham University, New York. Valued at the cost of full tuition plus yearly stipend of \$1,000, the fellowship is renewable.

Sister Carol Maureen Klistner, C.S.J., won an "Honorable Mention" in the annual Kappa Gamma Pi national short story contest for undergraduates in Catholic Women's Colleges. Originally written for the creative writing class, Sister Carol Maureen's story is entitled "Bits of Glory." It appears in *The Fountain* in an abbreviated form.

Adrienne Musial, an education major and a French minor, has been awarded an NDEA summer scholarship at Washington University, St. Louis. She is one of 22 to be granted such a course in the FLES section. Adrienne has also received a contract from Miss Patricia Ware, foreign language director in the St. Louis Public School System, to serve next fall in the major learning program with French as the alternate teaching field.

Freshman Mary Petropoulos is the second grand award winner in the annual Reed and Barton Silver Opinion Competition. Carrying a \$300 scholarship, this grand prize was one of ten ranging from \$500 to \$100, to be given in which 15,000 college women in the United States competed.

Faculty Votes Six Seniors For Scholastic Honor Societies

Six seniors have been voted by the faculty into honor societies, according to letters which they received recently from Sister Mary Alfred Noble, C.S.J., president of Fontbonne.

Hilda Bantle and Kathleen Gentile, both of whom will graduate *summa cum laude*, have been elected to Kappa Gamma Pi and Delta Epsilon Sigma. Hilda is a dietetics major from Indianapolis; Kathleen, a psychology major from St. Louis. Joanne Esle, Madelyn Forman, Ruth Kloud, and Elizabeth Messmer, who will graduate *cum laude*, have been voted into Delta Epsilon Sigma.

National

Both Kappa Gamma Pi and Delta Epsilon Sigma are national scholastic honor societies. Kappa is distinguished by the fact that it is also an activity honor society and is open only to Catholic graduates of women's colleges. Kappa candidates must have at least an honor point average of 2.6; beside this high standard of scholarship,

candidates must have met the qualifications of character, service and leadership during their college years and must give promise of being active participants in Church and secular fields after graduation.

Delta Epsilon Sigma recognizes academic accomplishment (at least a 2.5 honor point average), fosters scholarly activities, and provides an intellectual meeting ground for its members. DES is open not only to graduates but to undergraduates who have completed at least fifty per cent of the baccalaureate requirements and have met the other specifications.

Two Juniors

Two juniors qualify for undergraduate membership in Delta—Patricia Cramer and Carolyn Osiek. These two students were voted into the Fontbonne chapter of DES last week. Beginning in September, 1961, the Delta chapter will function primarily as a campus honors core. The executive board, composed of faculty members, will at that time elect into the chapter present sophomores who as juniors qualify for DES.

Barbara Gutting, senior class president, received the distinction of being voted by the faculty to receive the Fontbonne Alumnae hood. Each year the alumnae association presents the hood to an outstanding senior who is a practical commentary on the objectives of a Fontbonne education.

Mary Louise Langdon, a sophomore, will receive the St. Catherine medal, presented by the St. Louis Kappa Gamma Pi chapter to a sophomore who at this stage of her college education seems to be a potential Kappa.

All honors were presented by Sister Mary Alfred at the honors convocation on Wednesday.

Attend Lectures On Anti-Communism

With its theme "Eternal Vigilance is the price of liberty" the Greater St. Louis School of Anti-Communism was presented April 24 through 28. Students in the history department were given excused absences to attend one of the lectures.

The non-profit, five-day school was sponsored by a group of leading citizens in cooperation with the Christian Anti-Communism Crusade. Its purpose was to educate the citizens of Missouri about Communism, what it is, its "blueprint for the United States" and how to intelligently combat this deadly menace at the local, state, and national level.

Some of the highlights of the week included lectures on the "Philosophy of Communism" by Dr. Fred Schwarz, president of the Anti-Communism Crusade; "I Led Three Lives" by Herbert Philbrick, former FBI counterespionage; and the "Communism Psychiatry and Crime" by W. Cleon Skousen, formerly of the FBI and author of "The Naked Communist." All who served on the faculty are among the world's foremost authorities on Communism.

The School closed Friday evening, April 28, with a banquet at which Dr. Schwarz spoke on the "Design for Victory."
