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Fontbonne Confers Degrees On Largest Class May 26

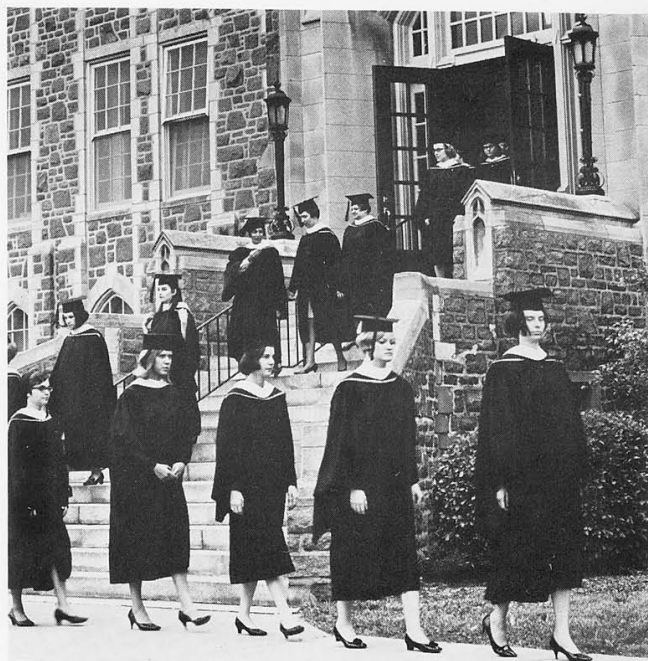
The largest graduating class in Fontbonne's 45 year history received their degrees Sunday night, May 26, at 7 o'clock p.m.

Mrs. Leonor K. Sullivan, representative to the United States House of Representatives from Missouri's Third District, gave the commencement address. Representative Sullivan emphasized the opportunities open to women; she said that these opportunities, however, depend mainly on professional preparation.

The candidates were presented by Sister Ernest Marie, president.

The Most Reverend George J. Gottwald, auxiliary bishop of St. Louis, conferred the degrees.

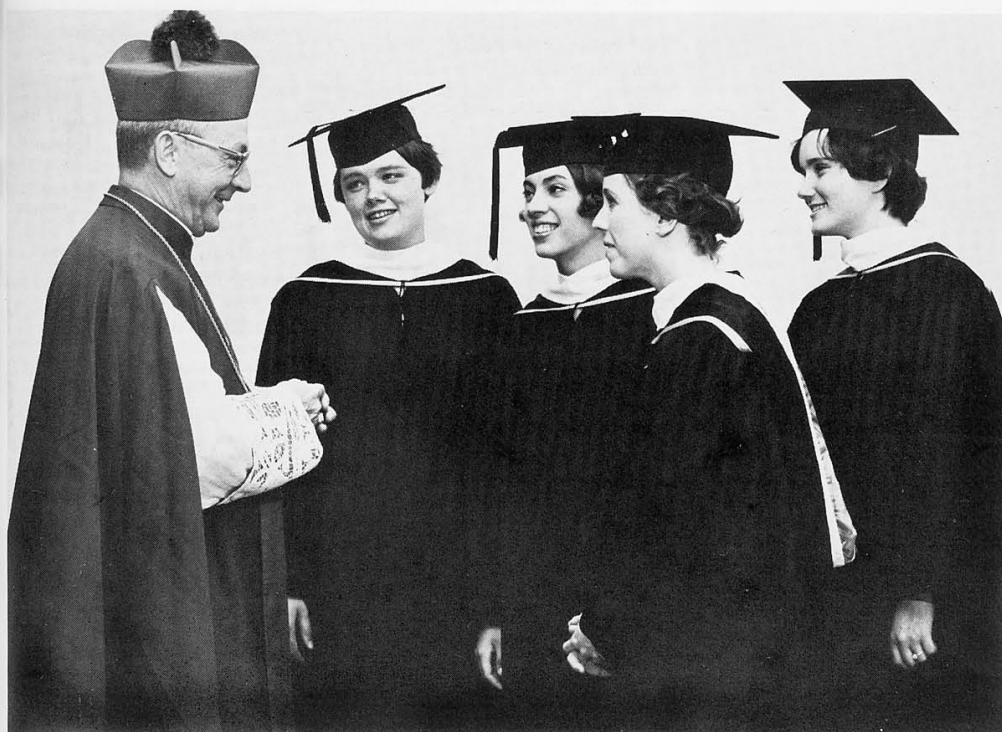

1968 Graduates' Plans Announced

The 1968 graduates numbered 163. Their plans for the immediate future include teaching or some other type of employment and graduate or further study.

One hundred and seventeen of the graduating class are certified teachers in an NCATE approved program and most of this number will be teaching next year. Of the 117 teachers, 56 are qualified to teach on the secondary level and 61 on the elementary school level. Fourteen of the graduates have dual certification in deaf and elementary education. Another seven of the 61 elementary majors are special education majors, certified to teach both normal students and the educable mentally retarded.

Approximately one-fourth of the graduating class will be employed in professional positions in their special areas by various companies and corporations in the country.

Twenty-eight of the graduates plan further study of some type next year. Eleven will attend graduate school full-time and two part-

time. Another 15 will intern in dietetics or medical technology.

Of the five chemistry majors, two plan to be teachers and three will be research assistants in the fall. Sister Dora Francis, CSJ, and Sister Maria Jeanne, CSJ, will teach chemistry at St. Thomas Aquinas High School in Augusta, Georgia, and St. Joseph's Academy in St. Louis, respectively.

The three research assistants are: Carolyn Brown who will work in cell biology at Washington University medical school; Clare Borgmeyer who will be employed by Beck Vanilla Co. to experiment in artificial flavorings; and Jan Matthews who will work inorganic chemistry at Monsanto Co.

Two Spanish majors will teach on the secondary level in St. Louis. Ann Keller will be a faculty member at Rosary High School; Joyce Hoff at St. Elizabeth's Academy.

Sister Carol Orf, CPPS, a speech and drama major, will teach at St. Joseph's High School in Omaha, Nebraska.

Barb Stieven Rampone and Sue Kruse, business majors, will work near their husbands' military bases in Germany and Florida. Also in business, Kyllene McClintock will be in Fontbonne's Admissions Office.

Fourteen graduated in deaf education. Ten of these plan to be teachers of the deaf in the fall. At St. Joseph's Institute for the Deaf in St. Louis, Donna Varchetti and Sister Margaret Raymond, CSJ, will teach the first grade and the intermediate grade levels, respectively. Also, at the Institute, Jo Ann Hubach will teach two-year-olds and math in the upper school. Pam Kraus will work with junior high level deaf students in the St. Louis County Special School District. Another deaf education major with a position in the St. Louis area is Kay Sanders who will teach in the Jefferson Oral-Deaf and Speech Dept. of the East St. Louis School District. Pam Castro will teach pre-school deaf children in Roxana, Illinois; Maureen Pfeiffer, elementary deaf children in Grand Rapids, Michi-

gan; and Mary Lee Walter, deaf children in the primary dept. in Kalamazoo, Michigan. At Evans School for the Deaf in Denver, Colorado Joel Kaske plans to teach first grade children and Margaret Zarinelli, pre-school children.

Sheila Fitzgerald will attend graduate school at St. Louis University in Speech Pathology and Audiology.

The graduates in the special education program are certified to teach normal elementary school children and the educable mentally retarded. Tina Viviano will work next year with slow learners in the third grade in the Normandy School District. Two special education majors will teach in the St. Louis Special School District with Cissy Malone working with intermediate students (9-11 year-olds) at Parks School and Pat Kottenstette at Wirtz School. In the fall, Mary Menne will be a teacher of the mentally retarded for the Special Education Board in Eureka, Missouri.

Two sociology majors planning graduate school in the fall are Sister Helen Andrew, CSJ, and Elaine Belovich. Elaine received a fellowship to Washington University where she will continue next fall in a Masters of Arts in Teaching program. Sister will study at St. Louis University.

Rep. Sullivan Urges Graduates: Know How to Work

"I do want you to know that what you have been taught at Fontbonne--the professional skills you have acquired, the learning you have absorbed, the philosophy of service to humanity I know you have developed--are valuable, saleable commodities in the marketplace of commerce and industry, government and the professions. What is more important for you to know is that most of you are going to have to, or want to, put those skills to work professionally--for pay--before you reach eligibility for Medicare and retirement."

These were the introductory remarks of Congresswoman Leonor K. Sullivan in her commencement address. Throughout her career, Mrs. Sullivan has been shown a strong interest in consumer issues. Mrs. Sullivan, currently a senior member of the House Committee on Banking and Currency, was named at the start of the 88th Congress as Chairman of the newly created Subcommittee on Consumer Affairs, with primary legislative responsibility for the

Consumer Credit Protection Act, which includes her truth in lending measure.

In Mrs. Sullivan's graduation speech, which she referred to as Congresswoman Sullivan's Truth in Living Law for Women, Mrs. Sullivan hoped that the graduates would remember one thought from their commencement speaker. "Know how to work for pay even if you don't intend to work." She urged the graduates to keep up with the developments and literature within their vocational fields even during those years away from the job and in the home.

Congresswoman Sullivan explained further part two of her Truth in Living Law for Women: "Learn how to make whatever work you do not only more useful but fun as well." Drudgery on the job, said Mrs. Sullivan, is a waste of effort. She encouraged the graduates to use their minds to continue meeting difficult challenges, especially in the area of social concern.

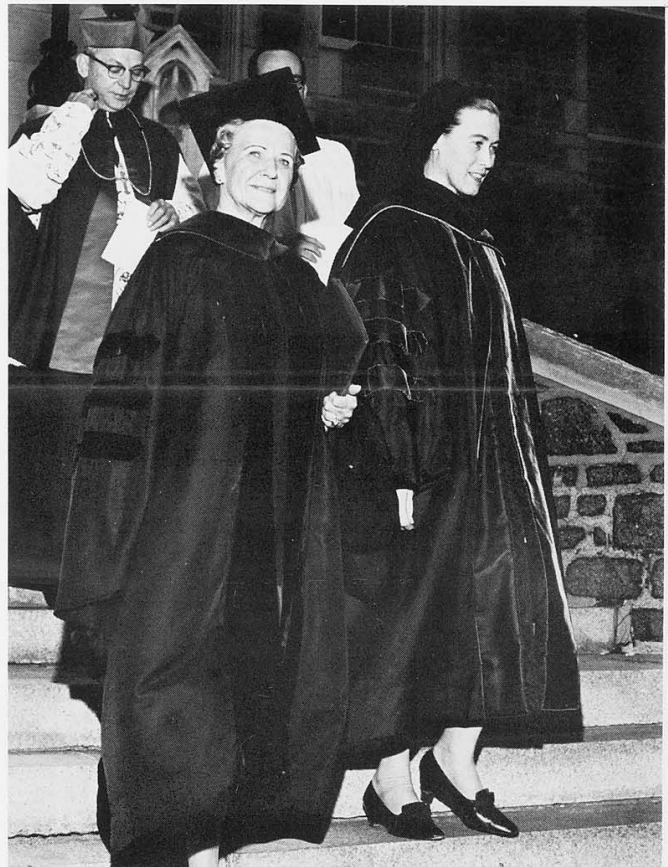
"As citizens you will have unlimited horizons for putting those

minds to work on the social and economic and deep-seated human problems of our society. As women, you can bring compassion and understanding to those issues which men often handle in remote detachment."

"Any job can be drudgery, I know, including those jobs which some of us consider the most exciting in the world. But if the work you do involves helping others -- doing good for the poor or the helpless or the aged or the ill or the deprived or the young

-- then I charge you not to permit it to be routine; I call upon you to infuse your own excitement into it, and make it interesting and worthwhile.

Mrs. Sullivan, now serving her sixth term, is the only woman ever to have served in Congress from the State of Missouri. She is the widow of Representative John Berchmans Sullivan, who was serving his fourth term in the Congress at the time of his death in 1951.
